blacklist/whitelist	• Use allow/disallow, allowlist/denylist, safe senders list/blocklist.
black box	Use functional testing, acceptance testing.
cripple	• Use hinder.
digital native	• Use Gen X, Gen Y / Millennial, or Gen Z (but see this article for an argument against using "generation" labels at all).
disabled, differently abled, handicapped	• Use has a <i>disability, person with disability,</i> or <i>people with disabilities.</i>
diverse students	Use students from diverse backgrounds.
dummy value	• Use placeholder value.
first-class citizen	Use core concept, top-level
freshman, freshmen	• Use first-year student(s).
grandfathered	 The term is problematic because of age but primarily because of race. Use <i>legacy</i> or <i>preexisting</i>.
grayhat	Use hactivist.
hang	Use stop responding, freeze.
he/she, he or she, him or her	 Use singular <i>they</i> as a person's pronoun or to refer to one individual if their gender isn't known.
hearing impaired	 Use Deaf (the community), deaf (audiological status), partial hearing loss, and/or hard of hearing.
housekeeping tasks	• Use maintenance, upkeep.
kill	• Use halt, stop.
male/female	• Use <i>plug, socket/jack</i> when referring to cable connectors.
manhours	• Use hours of effort, engineer hours, employee hours.
mankind, manpower	Use gender-neutral humankind or people.
master/slave	Use primary/secondary, main/subordinate.
native feature	• Use built-in feature.
preferred pronouns	 Pronouns are not preferences; they are words that accurately describe a person. Use pronouns or gender pronouns
sanity check	• Use quick check, confidence check, or coherence check.
visually impaired	• Use blind, legally blind, or low vision, or refer to the person as a screen reader/magnifier user.
white box	• Use glass box testing, clear box testing.
whitespace	Use blank space, empty space.
